SOME SLANG/TERMS YOU WILL COME ACROSS IN GEORGIA

Y'all: You all, all of you

Dawgs: Misspelling/pronunciation of "dogs", usually referring to the University of Georgia football team

Holler: To yell, to call (someone)

404: An Atlanta phone area code, the number is used to mean "Atlanta" or "in the Atlanta area"

Might Could: Maybe can, might be able to

"85": What locals call interstate 85 which runs through Atlanta and GA from North to South

OTP: Outside the perimeter; Any address/place outside of interstate 285

ITP: Inside the perimeter; Any address/place inside interstate 285


"The A-T-L"/"The A": Nicknames for Atlanta
